When and how did you start your business?

In 2011 when I was 21 - "how?" is a big question! Essentially my business partner and I sold an event we had created ran for two years at the SECC (it was called Scotland's Ski & Snowboard Show), and put all of the money (about £30,000) into refurbishing a shop on Rose St, which became the first ever Social Bite shop! We were inspired to start a "social business" and take the personal greed out of business by a trip to Bangladesh.

What is the best thing about being an entrepreneur?

Being your own boss... being able to inspire other people to do what they are passionate about... and being able to make top level decisions about things you think should be done better. There's nothing more frustrating than working for someone else's company and seeing all of the mistakes they make for their staff AND their customers and feeling powerless to do something about it!

3 top tips for aspiring Entrepreneurs

- 1) Be bold dream big. The world was created by people no smarter than you!
- 2) Listen listening well means asking questions too! When you don't know how something works, or why it works that why. Listen properly, ask stupid questions you'll end up the smartest person in the room.

Why I chose a career over further education?

I decided not to attend further education as I didn't know exactly what I wanted to do for a career. I also chose not to attend further education as you are not always guaranteed a job in the subject you have chosen to study and gain qualifications in.

While browsing on My Job Scotland, I saw a job being advertised for a modern apprenticeship in Customer Services with The City of Edinburgh Council. Although, I no longer work in Customer Services, it was a great start for me to gain experience and also add to my CV. I then managed to apply for a Business Assistant role within the Council and was then able to apply for a Personal Assistant/Secretary job as I had gained experience in working for Senior Managers. I have managed to secure a permanent job as a Personal Assistant for the Principal of The University of Edinburgh and I don't think I would have been able to get this far if I had chosen further education.

The benefits of going straight into work after school

Not only are you gaining experience in employment but you are also gaining a salary. After working for The University of Edinburgh for nearly 3 years, I have started to understand how expensive being a student is. Student loans are available but some students only get a small loan which means working in a part time job to cover other expenses like student halls or daily living.

Duke of Edinburgh Award



The Duke of Edinburgh's Award has been running for over sixty years and is now an internationally recognised scheme, with programmes running not just in the UK but also as far as Canada, Australia and Hong Kong. The wide range of skills young people develop during the Award make it a valuable addition to their CV, and will boost job and university applications.

Since October, a group of S3 pupils from St Augustine's have been participating in the Award, and have committed their own time to engage in activities from computer programming to sports leadership to learning a foreign language. Several of our pupils are making a real contribution to the community by volunteering with homelessness and disability charities.

In a couple of weeks, the Duke of Edinburgh group will be going on a hiking expedition to the Pentland Hills and camping overnight. In preparation for this, they have spent several hours planning routes and meals, and will be learning how to cook outdoors. They have had to use problem solving skills to read maps and to discuss how to stay safe in emergency situations. The expedition is a brilliant opportunity for them to put their organisation, problem solving and team work skills to the test.

My experience at HTA Design LLP

I took Advanced Higher Graphics Communication because I want to study architecture at university, I planned my project to allow me to incorporate my interest in architecture. Going forward with the project I was advised to contact a company which could guide me with my project and how I could relate it to my desired field; architecture. I spent some time looking for architect offices within Edinburgh. I eventually contacted HTA Design LLP. After contacting them I managed to arrange a workplace visit to their office in Leith. Whilst there I met a number of professionals who were more than happy to advise and oversee my work for Advanced Higher Graphic Communication. Through some rearranging of my S6 timetable I was able to arrange 5 study periods where I could visit the office weekly. During my time at the office I had my own desk equipped with any software I might need and I was treated as a full time office employee- unrestricted access to an espresso machine, healthy snacks as well as a cooked meal at lunch. I received weekly guidance as I updated them on my progress through the term. Each week I could seek advice with any issues I was having whether it was related to software, design or simply where to go next. I am extremely happy with my coursework and I know I have achieved a good mark. I urge anyone considering this as an option to definitely try to arrange a similar relation with an industry member if you are studying Advanced Higher Graphic Communication or even another subject. I have gained skills that will directly relate to the university course I wish to study, as well as a direct contact to industry experts. I have also arranged a whole week of work experience during the summer. This has and will go on to benefit me and my studies going forwards in higher education.
