


S2 Art & Design students were blown away by the V & A Dundee

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Geography Field Trips



Celebrating Success in S4

This term saw many fourth year pupils secure an SQA accredited wider achievement award as a result of their participation in the Youth and Philanthropy Initiative last year.



"Taking part in the 2018 Model United Nations Conference at James Gillespies High School has enhanced my understanding of international law and how states cooperate with each other by addressing political issues such as the effects of neo-colonialism. It has also developed my critical thinking and analytical skills by raising inconsistencies in arguments or challenging facts; this furthered my research and public speaking skills."



Edinburgh Mini Trials

On Saturday the 8th of December eleven S4/5 pupils took part in the Edinburgh Mini Trials event at Edinburgh Sheriff Court. The Mini Trials, held annually from 2003 and supported by the Faculty of Advocates, involves pupils from schools across Edinburgh and are an enjoyable way to learn about the Scottish legal system. Pupils took part in the reconstructions of two criminal jury trials, assuming the roles of lawyers, court officials, witnesses and jurors. Pupils worked with a Prosecution lawyer and a Defence solicitor prior to the trial to prepare their case. Sadiyah, Maryam, Kerri, T-Jay, Brendan, Dylan, Niamh, Skye, Rhona, Harris, Sophie and Callum all did an excellent job and were a credit to the school.


Commemoration and Remembrance

10th St Augustine's Battlefield Experience



10th St Augustine's Battlefield Experience – 24th-29th June 2018

On the 24th June 2018, the 10th St Augustine's Battalion embarked on a journey that they would never forget to the battlefields of Belgium and France. Pupils arrived in Belgium bleary eyed and unaware of how this experience would ultimately change them. The 10th Pals walked in the footsteps of soldiers, heard their personal stories, and came away with a greater sense of respect for the men who paid the ultimate sacrifice. Pupils also had the opportunity to pay their respects to two young men on our school Roll of Honour: Private James Grant who is remembered with honour on the Menin Gate and Lieutenant William Alexander McIntosh who is remembered with honour at Tyne Cot Cemetery. Overall, the experience was a humbling one and the pupils were a credit to the school and their parents. (Mrs Cochrane)

Lessons From Auschwitz – Amy S6

My Auschwitz experience began when I attended my first seminar on Sunday 30th September. At this event I had the opportunity to listen to survivors of the Holocaust, and reflect on their words and testimony. The purpose of the seminar was not only to deepen my understanding of the Holocaust but to prepare me for my trip to Auschwitz-Birkenau the following week.

As I walked through the camp I was struck by the sheer horrors of the Holocaust. The tragedy of the suffering had a huge impact on me. Witnessing the gas chambers and the living quarters first hand are sights that I will not forget.



Following my experience I will be speaking to S2 classes as well as leading school assemblies to highlight the horrors of the Holocaust and to ensure that we never allow this to happen again.

School Uniform Policy

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Parents are asked to co-operate with the school in encouraging the wearing of the school uniform. Wearing school uniform contributes to a positive school ethos, helps avoid discrimination and reduces peer pressure to wear expensive designer clothing. Our uniform comprises:-

- Black tailored trousers or skirts of a suitable length
- White school shirt
- School Tie
- Sensible black school shoes
- Blue School Blazer with school badge (for years S5 & S6)

A plain black v-neck cardigan or v-neck jumper is acceptable over a white school shirt and school tie

Ties can be purchased from the School Office

Jeans, joggers, leggings, jeggings, tracksuit bottoms, trainers and designer tops, caps and boots, including ankle boots, are not appropriate school wear

Free Schools Meal & Help with School Uniform

Some funding allocated to schools is based on pupils receiving Free School Meal entitlement. This allows us to provide extra support to our pupils. We do think a number of families who should be receiving this benefit are not currently claiming this support. This means they do not receive the help with meals but also means we do not receive all the additional funding we could.

We would encourage you all to apply if you are entitled to do so (see below). Money for free meals is put automatically on to pupils Young Scot cards. The cards can be used to purchase food at lunchtime and a variety of hot and cold food is available. If your child does not have a Young Scot card, or has lost their card, the school office can issue a pin number and give details of how to get a new card. If you think you are entitled please do apply! Help with the form is available through your child's pupil support teacher.

Assistance is also provided to children from low income families in the form of clothing vouchers which go towards buying school uniform. You can claim for free school meals and assistance with school wear for your children if you are receiving:

- Income Support (IS)
- Income-based Job Seeker's Allowance (JSA)
- Any income related element of Employment and Support Allowance
- Child Tax Credit (CTC), but not Working Tax Credit, and your income is less than £16,105
- Both maximum Child Tax Credit and maximum Working Tax Credit and your income is under £6,420
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Universal Credit

If you are between 16 and 18 years old and receive any of these benefits in your own right, you can claim free school lunches for yourself. If you match these conditions and do not receive any element of Working Tax Credit you can also claim school wear vouchers. The form for applying can be collected from the school office and you can send the completed form and supporting evidence by post (address on the form) or by email to: school.grants@edinburgh.gov.uk



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
