

Fresh Start





Free Schools Meal & Help with School Uniform

Some funding allocated to schools is based on pupils receiving Free School Meal entitlement. This allows us to provide extra support to our pupils. We do think a number of families who should be receiving this benefit are not currently claiming this support. This means they do not receive the help with meals but also means we do not receive all the additional funding we could.

We would encourage you all to apply if you are entitled to do so (see below). Money for free meals is put automatically on to pupils Young Scot cards. The cards can be used to purchase food at lunchtime and a variety of hot and cold food is available. If your child does not have a Young Scot card, or has lost their card, the school office can issue a pin number and give details of how to get a new card. If you think you are entitled please do apply! Help with the form is available through your child's pupil support teacher.

Assistance is also provided to children from low income families in the form of clothing vouchers which go towards buying school uniform. You can claim for free school meals and assistance with school wear for your children if you are receiving:

- Income Support (IS)
- Income-based Job Seeker's Allowance (JSA)
- Any income related element of Employment and Support Allowance
- Child Tax Credit (CTC), but not Working Tax Credit, and your income is less than £16,105
- Both maximum Child Tax Credit and maximum Working Tax Credit and your income is under £6,420
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Universal Credit

If you are between 16 and 18 years old and receive any of these benefits in your own right, you can claim free school lunches for yourself. If you match these conditions and do not receive any element of Working Tax Credit you can also claim school wear vouchers. The form for applying can be collected from the school office and you can send the completed form and supporting evidence by post (address on the form) or by email to: school.grants@edinburgh.gov.uk

Duke of Edinburgh Skills for Work and Life

The Duke of Edinburgh award allows our pupils to develop a multitude of skills for work and life.

But recently it has also enhanced the skills of our staff. Some staff members took part in canoe training (CPLP) on the canal. The skills our staff have picked up during this training can then be transferred to our young people.

So, what is the Duke of Edinburgh Award?

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is a voluntary, non-competitive and flexible programme of cultural and adventurous activities for all young people aged between 14 and 25 years old, whatever their background or ability.

Through a DofE programme young people have fun, make friends, improve their self-esteem and build confidence. They gain essential skills and attributes for work and life such as resilience, problem-solving, team-working, communication and drive, enhancing CVs and university and job applications.

More specifically our young people are developing in the following areas as they work through their DofE programme:

- Self-belief and self-confidence
- A sense of identity
- Initiative and a sense of responsibility
- A real awareness of their strengths
- New talents and abilities
- The ability to plan and use time effectively
- Learning from and giving to others in the community
- Forming new friendships
- Problem solving, presentation and communication skills
- Leadership and teamworking skills.

S3 Money Sense programme

On Thursday 12 December 2020, S3 Business Management took part in the Career Sense Programme. This programme encouraged our students to unlock their potential and discover more about critical skills needed in the financial sector. Teams Video Meetings - Microsoft



Schools in Edinburgh are using Microsoft Teams to keep in touch with students who are isolating or unable to attend school. In addition, in the event of school closure, we expect to use Teams to deliver "blended learning" just like we did during lockdown last session. Previously some teachers were delivering lessons using online video meetings. However the system was set up so that pupils could see and hear a teacher, but the teacher could only hear but not see the pupil. In future pupils will be able to switch on their camera so that the teacher can both hear and see them. We hope that this two way communication will improve the quality of blended learning. It is not our intention to stream whole class lessons as this is impractical. The intention is to provide extra support to individuals or small groups if necessary. It can also be used for assessment purposes if pupils are unable to attend school.

There is no pressure on pupils or staff to use this facility. If someone does not want to switch on their camera then they do not have to. This is an added extra that we hope will enhance the existing ability where possible.

School Uniform Policy

Parents are asked to co-operate with the school in encouraging the wearing of the school uniform. Wearing school uniform contributes to a positive school ethos, helps avoid discrimination and reduces peer pressure to wear expensive designer clothing. Our uniform comprises:-

- Black tailored trousers or skirts of a suitable length
- White school shirt
- **School Tie**
- Sensible black school shoes
- Blue School Blazer with school badge (for years S5 & S6)

A plain black v-neck cardigan or v-neck jumper is acceptable over a white school shirt and school tie Ties can be purchased from the school via ParentPay

Jeans, joggers, leggings, jeggings, tracksuit bottoms, trainers and designer tops, caps and boots, including ankle boots, are not appropriate school wear
